

Globe Chamomile/ Stink Net

Stinknet (Oncosiphon piluliferum) is a relatively recent and problematic arrival to Arizona. This plant is spreading rapidly in both urban and wild areas and can quickly dominate a landscape. Plants grow in dense clusters and easily displace native vegetation. During growth the plants can cause severe allergic reactions, both dermal and respiratory. Infestations spread rapidly along roadways and open fields in residential areas. Dried dense patches are highly flammable.



What's New at the McDowell Sonoran Preserve

Tour de Scottsdale - April 12

This premier bicycling event is sponsored by and benefits the McDowell Sonoran Preserve. The start and finish will be at WestWorld in Scottsdale and the 62-mile route travels north from WestWorld at Pima Road to Dynamite, continuing east on Rio Verde Drive to Forest Road, McDowell Mountain Road and through Fountain Hills then returning to WestWorld. The ride begins at 7:00 a.m. on Saturday, April 12 and continues until approximately 2:00 p.m. There will be traffic safety measures in place throughout the ride.



Reminder About E-bikes

E-bikes remain prohibited in the Preserve unless the user is covered by the ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act).

Many users have obtained a voluntary accommodation sticker from the City by calling (480) 312-4444.
Below is a list of where e-bikes are permitted.

McDowell Mountain Regional Park 16300 McDowell Mountain Park Dr. Fountain Hills, AZ 85268 (602) 506-2930 ext. 3 - Class 1 and Class 2

Cave Creek Regional Park 37019 N. Lava Lane Cave Creek, AZ 85331 (602) 506-2930 ext. 8 - Class 1 and Class 2 - all e-bikes are allowed on motorized trails and roads (everywhere except in the Wilderness areas) Indian Bend Wash Greenbelt

Tonto National Forest - all e-bikes are allowed on motorized trails and roads (everywhere except in the Wilderness areas)

Indian Bend Wash Greenbelt-Class 1 and 2 City of Phoenix-Phoenix Mountains Preserve and Phoenix Sonoran Preserve trails - except NO bikes on the Camelback Mountain trails (Echo and Cholla), the Piestewa Peak Summit Trail and the North Mountain Tower Road. No Class 3 E-Bikes.

Brown's Ranch Interpretive Trail is Now Open

Hikers walking the Corral Trail in Scottsdale's McDowell Sonoran Preserve have for years wondered about the scattershot of crumbling concrete and contorted metal strewn about the site of the old Browns Ranch. The mysteries have been solved.

The new Browns Ranch Interpretive Trail reveals the details.

Opened in October 2024, the easy 0.3-mile loop trail features 20 educational displays that identify the rusty parts and faint remains of a working cattle operation that operated from 1916 through the 1970s. It also tells the story of the ranch founders — the Brown family — as well as the Native peoples, evolving technologies, military presence and personalities that shaped the area from prehistory through the Old West and into the present.

Beautifully illustrated signs address topics like how ranchers found water, what life was like as a hired hand and inventive construction and manufacturing methods used in the area.

First timers and regular preserve visitors alike will appreciate how the embellished trail enriches the hiking experience.

The site is reached by hiking 1.4 miles north on Browns Ranch Road from the Browns Ranch Trailhead.





Fun Facts - Dixie Mine

The Dixie Mine, located in the interior of the McDowells, is abandoned except for desert denizens such as bats. Entry is blocked by metal gates and screens. The interior is hazardous. The main shaft has a depth of 240 feet with several feet of water at its bottom. In addition, there are two 50-foot drops along a tunnel from the ground level entry to the main shaft. Potential cave ins, noxious gases, and shaft falls remain threats. There are over 100,000 abandoned mines in Arizona, of which only 19,000 have been identified and even fewer secured.



Vehicle Break-ins

Luckily, we have not had many vehicle break-ins lately, but the increased traffic of winter visitors can provide opportunities for thieves at the trail head parking lots. Please remember to leave your valuables at home when visiting the Preserve. Please continue to be vigilant and report any suspicious activity to the Scottsdale Police Department. For emergencies, call 911. For non-emergencies please call 480-312-5000 for Scottsdale Police Dispatch. Your safety is the primary goal, but if you can safely take photos or make mental notes of the suspicious activity, please do so. Police dispatch will ask you questions such as height and weight, ethnicity, color of clothing, direction of travel, vehicle description, license plate number, etc.


